Memorial Day Order

General Orders No. 11, Grand Army of the Republic Headquarters.

I. The 30th day of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance no form or ceremony is prescribed, but Posts and comrades will, in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit.

We are organized, Comrades, as our regulations tell us, for the purpose among other things, "of preserving and strengthening those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together the soldiers sailors and marines, who united to suppress the late rebellion." What can aid more to assure this result than by cherishing tenderly the memory of our heroic dead? We should guard their graves with sacred vigilance. All that the consecrated wealth and taste of the nation can add to their adornment and security, is but a fitting tribute to the memory of her slain defenders. Let pleasant paths invite the coming and going of reverent visitors and fond mourners. Let no neglect, no ravages of time, testify to the present or to the coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic.

If other eyes grow dull and other hinds slack, and other hearts cold in the solemn trust, ours shall keep it well as long as the light and warmth of life remain in us.

Let us, then, at the time appointed, gather around their sacred remains, and garland the passionless mounds above them with choicest flowers of springtime; let us raise above them the dear old flag they saved; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledge to aid and assist those whom they have left among us a sacred charge upon the Nation's gratitude—the soldier's and sailor's widow and orphan.

II. It is the purpose of the Commander-in-Chief to inaugurate this observance with the hope that it will be kept up from year to year, while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades. He earnestly desires the public press to call attention to this Order, and lend its friendly aid in bringing it to the notice of comrades in all parts of the country in time for simultaneous compliance therewith.

III. Department commanders will use every effort to make this Order effective.

One day the lieutenant from the Naval Reserve Training Facility at Eagle Point called him and said they were looking for an electronic technician to work with the radio and radar equipment at the training center and to teach the reservists to repair electronic equipment of all kinds. He said he would start John out at the same rate that he was when discharged from the regular Navy. There would be no broken service because it was within 90 days of his discharge. He would be stationed in Dubuque at Eagle Point and would have the same pay and benefits as if he was on active duty with the Navy. This was the dream of every sailor, to be in the Navy and stationed in his own home town. These sailors were called T.A.R.S. (Training & Administration of Reserves). John took the examination for Chief Petty Officer, passed, and was selected. It worked out well until 1951 when the Navy decided we had too much of a good thing. With the regular Navy people complaining about us reservists having the choice shore duty, the Navy gave us an ultimatum—either join the regular Navy or be discharged. John had quite a few years of active duty by then so he volunteered for an outfit called Communication Supplementary Activities. It was called CSA for short. His first duty was additional training at

Cheltenham Maryland, then on several destroyers in the Mediterranean Sea. The ships were the *Ware*, the *Vessole*, and the *Joy*. This lasted only a month or two.

The Navy called John and offered him a job at Great Lakes, IL. He took the job with the Navy at his old rate as Chief Electronic Technician at Great Lakes Naval Training Center. His title was Chief of the Master Control Radio Station. Their mission was to handle communications from all the Naval Reserve Stations in the Ninth Naval District and also communications between Naval Districts and Washington, DC. In 1957 a job opened in the Electronic Warfare Unit in Mason City, IA. The job of station keeper at Mason City, IA was given to him and they moved to Mason City. Once again the Navy issued an order that all Naval Reserve people serving in TAR positions at Naval Reserve Facilities would either have to enlist in the Regular Navy or get out. John made an agreement with the Navy that if they would send him to Electronic Technician School at Treasure Island, CA he would enlist in the regular Navy for six years. The Navy granted his request. In fall, 1959 the family went to California. John attended Electronics Class B School at Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay.

The month before graduation John was picked to go to the pre-commissioning detail of the USS *Enterprise* (CVAN-65) in Newport News, VA. First he had to go to Great Lakes Naval Station for four months of computer school. Afterwards he was sent back to the Hugh's Aircraft site in Carbon Canyon near Fullerton, CA. This

instruction lasted three months. The radar he studied was the SPS-32 long range search radar. It was the first fixed array radar ever installed on a ship.

After the building of the ship was completed, it was commissioned. The Commissioning Ceremony was an elaborate affair. Then John went on a shakedown cruise off Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. The ship and crew passed and returned to Norfolk, VA.

From Norfolk came a few cruises to the Mediterranean Sea stopping at Gulf Juan, France; Naples, Italy; Athens, Greece; Beirut, Lebanon; Barcelona, Spain; and a few other islands; a Mercury Space Capsule recovery mission off Cape Hatteras, and participating in the Cuban Crisis. Then John was transferred to the Naval Base at Norfolk as an instructor at the electronic school there. He spent about one year there before retiring from the Navy. John's rank upon retirement was Senior Chief Petty Officer (E8).

John then received a job offer from MURA, near Stoughton. This is now a part of the University of Wisconsin and known as the Physical Sciences Lab. He retired from the University of Wisconsin in July 1988 after 20 years of service.

John is a life member of the VFW, American Legion, and the Naval Fleet Reserve. He served as commandant of the local fleet reserve.



John was awarded the following medals:

Navy Good Conduct American Defense American Campaign Asiatic Pacific Campaign China Service WW 2 Victory Navy Occupation National Defense

In 1948, John married Adele Runde. Together John and Adele raised seven children: Ann, Bob, Tom, Dick, Ellen, Dave, and Tim. They have 10 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

John is very proud of his 30 years serving his country in the US NAVY.


